#### Introducing Our Members

Organist Katelyn Emerson performs throughout the United States, showcasing repertoire spanning from the 14th-20th centuries "superlative and giving performance with musical precision" (Worcester Chapter, AGO). She has performed in numerous venues, notably including the Cathédrale Poitiers (France), Église Notre-Dame (Épernay, France), Mechanics Hall (Worcester, MA), St. Patrick's Cathedral (New York, NY), the Kotzschmar Memorial Organ of Merrill Auditorium (Portland, ME), Severance Hall (Cleveland, OH) St. Mary, the Brick Presbyterian Church (New York, NY), Reith Recital Hall at Goshen College (Indiana), and others.

Katelyn received the Second Jean Boyer Award in the 2014 Fifth International Organ Competition Pierre de Manchicourt in Béthune and Saint-Omer, France and the second prize of the 2015 Arthur Poister Scholarship Competition in Syracuse, New York, where she will return to give a "Rising Star" recital in 2016. As the youngest of seven finalists, she received the title of Laureate and awarded Third Place, among other prizes, VIII Mikael **Tariverdiev** the International Organ Competition held in Kaliningrad, Russia. She won the Special Prize of the Krasnovarsk Philharmonic Society and will make her Russian concertizing debut Krasnovarsk, Russia in November 2015. Katelyn was also chosen to be one of The Diapason's "20 under 30 - Class of 2015," a group of young organists, organ builders, harpsichordists, and choral directors showing "superior accomplishments. leadership, creativity, and innovative thinking" and will be featured in The Diapason's May 2015 issue. As the winner of the 2011 Region V AGO/Quimby Regional Competition for Young Organists in Lexington Kentucky, Katelyn performed as a "Rising Star" at the AGO National Convention in Nashville, TN during the summer of 2012. She also won first place in the L. Cameron Johnson Memorial Competition for High School Organists in 2010, received the 2013 M. Louise Miller Scholarship, and was a 2014 Fellow at the Boston, MA, National Convention of the AGO.

In May 2015, Katelyn graduated from Oberlin College and Conservatory double (Oberlin, OH) with bachelor's degrees in organ performance and French as well as with minors in music history and historical performance (fortepiano). During her time at Oberlin, she taught music theory at the Oberlin Community Music School, received the Selby Harlan Houston prize for distinguished work in organ and music theory, and was inducted into Pi Kappa Lambda, the national music honors society. As a recipient of the J. William Fulbright Study/Research Grant, Katelyn will study at the Conservatoire à Rayonnement Régional in France for the 2015-2016 academic year with Michel Bouvard, Jan Willem Jansen, and Yasuko Uyama-Bouvard.

Katelyn began her organ studies in 2005 through a scholarship of the Young Organist Collaborative (Portsmouth, NH). She has studied with James David Christie, Olivier Latry, Marie-Louise Langlais, Ray Cornils, and Dr. Abbey Hallberg-Siegfried. She has also studied organ improvisation with Jeffrey Brillhart, Marie-Louise Langlais, and Bálint Karosi, piano with Arlene Kies, fortepiano with David Breitman, and both harpsichord and continuo with Webb Wiggins. Katelyn frequently presents masterclasses on organ interpretation and church music for AGOsponsored events. She has been on the faculty at several AGO Pipe Organ Encounters and at the Oberlin Summer Organ Academy.

While attending the 2011 and 2013 McGill Summer Organ Academies, Katelyn studied Improvisation, French Baroque music, French Romantic music, compositions of Louis Vierne, and works by Olivier Messiaen with Sietze de Vries, John Grew, Michel Bouvard, Olivier Latry, and Hans-Ola Ericsson, respectively. She

was the recipient of a scholarship to the 2011 Summer Institute for French Organ Studies in Poitiers and Épernay France where she studied with Dr. Jesse Eschbach and Gene Bedient and performed on organs of the French romantic and classical styles.

Katelyn just completed her five-year tenure as music director of St. Paul Lutheran Church in Amherst, OH, where she provided ministry through leading services with the piano and organ and directing the adult choir and the hand-bell choir. She was previously assistant organist and pianist of First Baptist Church in Hampton Falls, NH. Katelyn has been the Sacred Music Intern at the Church of the Advent in Boston, MA, studying with Mark Dwyer and Ross Wood, since 2013 and, in January 2012, Katelyn serviced as the Oberlin Sacred Music Intern with music director Keith Tóth at the Brick Presbyterian Church in New York, NY, where she substituted as organist and choirmaster for the month of July in 2012, 2013, and 2014. Katelyn has been invited to present workshops on recently published organ music for church services in the 2013 Regional Convention of the AGO in Hartford, Connecticut, Regions I & II, and 2015 Northeastern Regional Convention of the AGO in Hartford, Connecticut.

#### Members' News

The Conservatorio di Musica "G. P. da Palestrina" in Cagliari has organized for the first time an International Organ Festival. Events will take place in the Auditorium of the Conservatory (Balbiani Vegezzi Bossi organ, III/50), at the Cathedral (Mascioni organ, III/46) and at the Church of St. Rosalia (Tamburini organ, III/50). **Giorgio Parolini**, Professor of Organ at the Conservatory and Professional Development Coordinator of the European Chapter of the AGO, opened

the Festival with a concert at the Cathedral of Cagliari on June  $21^{st}$ , 2015 with music by J.S. Bach, F. Mendelssohn, C. Franck, M.E. Bossi and A. Guilmant.

In October 2015 part of the Festival will be devoted to Organ Music of the 20<sup>th</sup> century with masterclasses and concerts by Roman Perucki (October 1st) and Janos Palur (October 2<sup>nd</sup>) at the Auditorium of the Conservatory. Palu's Masterclass will on Improvisation. Two concerts on this subject will be performed at the Cathedral. The first of these is on October 16<sup>th</sup> by Giorgio Parolini and then on October 23<sup>rd</sup> by Angelo Castaldo, also Professor of Organ at the Conservatory. During these concerts several pieces written by pupils of the Composition Classes at the Conservatory (C. Mura, A. Carrus, Atzori, Calabrò, Gibroni, Lavena) will be premiered.

The last three events of the Festival will be a conference and concert on the organ music of Johannes Brahms (Giorgio Parolini, October 18<sup>th</sup> at the Church of St. Rosalia), a concert by Francesca Ajossa (pupil of Angelo Castaldo) who won the Second Prize ex-aequo at the "Premio Abbado 2015" Competition (November 20<sup>th</sup>, Auditorium of the Conservatorio) and a performance of Bach's "Orgelbuchlein" in two concerts at the Church of St. Rosalia on December 11<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup>. Performers will be Efisio Aresu, Fabrizia Lobina and Francesca Ajossa, pupils of Angelo Castaldo. #### "ORGANUM XXI" The Sound – Art – Organ in Marmoutier

### From now on there are two years to remember: 1710 and 2015

Incredible things happened in the Alsatian town of Marmoutier (28 km west of Strassburg). The sleepy little town has long been an insider tip for cultural and musically inclined, but after this year there will be two pipe organs in the city built

305 years apart but geographically close to other. famous The instrument completed in 1710 by Andreas Silbermann stands in the Abbey church dating from the 13<sup>th</sup> Century. The new "Sound – Art – Organ" with the name "Organum XXI" built by the Jäger & Brommer Organ Company from Baden, Germany, now stands in the European Organ Center, "C.I.P. Point d'orgues" (Organ Point), which was at one time the barn of a Benedictine Abbey. This unique instrument is installed in the centrally located "Hall aux sons" (Hall of Tone). It consists of 30 tonal colors (ranks) called Sound Islands. These and numerous additional sound effects are controlled by an ultramodern console and 2 touch screens. A pipe organ is always a highly interesting construction and this instrument allows one to see into many areas generally hidden from view, the manually constructed single wind chests on which the pipes stand, wind generator and the wind canals which direct the wind to where it needs to be when the organist gives the signal.

At first glance a traditional pipe organ with modern tonal resources which but sound. which produces one impressively brings a visitor optically and aurally closer to the subject "organ" and organ sounds truly in the style of the 21st Century. The "Organum XXI" instrument and the attractions in the other two rooms of the C.I.P. Organ Point in the heart of Europe are an exhibition for children, youth, adults, and seniors alike, but also for organists, composers and students. It is an invitation to hear, understand and admire the organ as an instrument that deserves it's nickname "The King of Instruments". This project will long be proof that the organ, even over 2000 years after it's invention, remains a young, fresh. vibrant and viable instrument for musical expression.

A special effect which is unique worldwide: eight of the stops (including the 16' Posaune, Principal 8' and up to 2') and the keys from low C to a''' can be operated

from the large touch-screen creating a tone collage or "smear" as a sonic experience. Perhaps an impetus for new music . . .

Truly a marker of achievement on the European organ landscape, the instrument by Silbermann and the "Sound - Art -Organ" by organ builders Heinz Jäger and Brommer Wolfgang ofWaldkirch. Germany, will be the pride and joy not only of Marmoutier and Alsace, but of the entire region at the heart of Europe. The master organ builders and their staff have proven that the organ is an exciting contemporary instrument with almost unlimited tonal potential that today can still inspire composers to new musical creations.

#### From our member **Christoph Keller**:

As some of you may know I composed a setting of "Ecce Sacerdos" for Choir and Organ in 2012 on the occasion of the Mettlach Pilgrimage as well as for the inauguration of the new 'Tuba Magna' in the Haerpfer organ by Bishop Karl-Heinz Wiesemann. The composition is dedicated to Fr. Thomas Schmitt.

After leaving the position of Music Director at St. Lutwinus, this piece was not

performed there anymore during the 2015 Mettlach Pilgrimage. Thus I am very happy and proud that this composition was performed for the first time in the United States on June 10<sup>th</sup>.

The Spring General Assembly of the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) was opened with a Mass at 5 PM Central Time (Midnight in Europe) in the Cathedral of Saint Louis. Approximately 250 bishops from across the United States gathered at this Mass. Under the direction of Dr. Horst Buchholz, Director of Sacred Music at the Cathedral and for the Archdiocese of St. Louis, the Cathedral Choir performed my music for the processional of the bishops into the Cathedral.

From Saint Louis I heard that the choir enjoyed learning and performing the work. I feel very honored to know that this piece of music, which is very important for me personally, was performed in such a prominent context.

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**Bernard Sanders** attended a special concert of the in Glarus, the smallest Canton in Switzerland. On Saturday, June 13<sup>th</sup>, the Music School presented a special concert in which young students performed as soloists with the Glarner Chamber Orchestra. On the program were a Violin concerto by Haydn, a Gitarre concerto by

Vivaldi and Kabalewski's 4<sup>th</sup> Piano Concerto. Finding no suitable repertoire for a young saxophone player, the Music School commissioned Sanders to arrange his composition "Tanz-Suite", originally for Alto Saxophone (English Horn) and Organ (Piano), for String Orchestra. This arrangement was then premiered by Jonas Ferndriger (14 years old), Saxophone, and the Glarner Chamber Orchestra under the direction of Reto Cuonz.

Sanders' organ work "Eclogue and Fugue in B-flat" was on the program for the first concert of this years "European Festival for Contemporary Sacred Music" in Brauweiler, Germany. Organist Gregor Simon performed it at the Brauweiler Abbey on May 28<sup>th</sup>. The piece was commissioned and composed in 2011 for the dedication concert of the new Jäger & Brommer organ in Nendingen and premiered there in July 2012 by Carolyn Shuster Fournier.

Concordia Publishing House has commissioned Sanders to do a setting of the Hymn-Tune "St. Thomas" for the next Volume in a series of chorale-preludes for the Lutheran Service Book. This is his fifth setting for the Series, preceded by Chorale Preludes on "The Lord's My Shepherd" (Belmont), "I Am Content" (Es ist genug), "When You Woke" (Joyous Light), and "Now the Light Has Gone" (Müde bin ich).

#### From our member

#### **Carolyn Shuster Fournier:**

Recently here in Paris, France, a few weeks ago, I was blessed to give a recital on Olivier Messiaen's organ (in the gallery) at the Trinité Church, where I am organist. A few days later, I accompanied Maurice Duruflé's *Requiem* on the Aristide Cavaillé-Coll choir organ at the Trinité Church under the direction of Till Aly, a young talented German conductor who is now living in Paris. This is one of the most difficult pieces I've ever performed and this was one of the most spiritual experiences I have ever known. The concert began with Arvo Pärt's *Beatitudes*,

which I accompanied on the gallery organ, then the choir sang Duruflé's Magnificat a cappella, and I performed his Prelude and Fugue on the name Alain (1942) on the gallery organ before going downstairs to accompany his Requiem (1947). As you likely know, Jehan Alain premiered his Litanies on Messiaen's organ at the Trinité Church on February 17, 1938 and Marie-Claire Alain played them for her First Prize in Organ at the Paris Conservatory. Originally from Louviers in Normandy, Maurice Duruflé was strongly affected by the war and these two pieces go hand-inhand to express the power of music to expresses man's utmost desire for liberty. More recently, after the massacre of the administration of Charlie Hebdo in France. our world is in dire need of liberty of expression. Each artist is a living emblem of liberty and our mission is to enlighten the world with harmonious beauty. During this concert, silence was the true bridge between the music and our mutual spiritual elevation. This is one of the greatest gifts I have ever received and I am very grateful!!!

#### News from HQ

#### **Cherry Rhodes and Ladd Thomas Honored by the AGO at Glendale Gala**

New York City. The AGO presented its Endowment annual Distinguished Artist Award Recital and Gala Benefit Reception honoring Cherry Rhodes and Ladd Thomas on Friday, April 17, at the First United Methodist Church of Glendale, Calif., where Dr. Thomas has served as organist for 55 years. An audience of more than 500 colleagues, students, friends, and loved ones came celebrate together to the lifetime achievements of this dynamic musical couple.

The Gala was sponsored by the AGO National Council and its Development Committee in cooperation with the First United Methodist Church of Glendale. The event raised approximately \$60,000 to be invested in the AGO Endowment Fund in the couple's honor. Annual earnings from the Endowment support the educational activities of the Guild.

The honorees performed a recital that included Mendelssohn's Sonata No. 1 in F Minor (Thomas), Moussorgsky's Pictures at an Exhibition, transcribed by Jean Guillou (Rhodes), and combined their talents on the organ bench in a rare organ duet performance of The Sorcerer's Apprentice by Dukas, as arranged by Rayner Brown for their exclusive use. The Gala Benefit Reception followed at the Hilton Los Angeles North/Glendale Hotel with 200 guests in attendance.

AGO President John Walker, FAGO, presented the honorees with the AGO Endowment Fund Distinguished Artist Award "for their exemplary careers as stellar performers and passionate teachers, and their lifelong service to the AGO and the sacred music profession."

Established in 1994, the AGO Endowment Fund provides income to educate new organists and to cultivate new audiences for organ and choral music. Taxdeductible contributions to the Endowment Fund are invested in perpetuity to produce

continuing income for essential Guild programs and educational projects. The AGO's annual Gala travels around the country to celebrate distinguished members of the organ world. Past AGO Gala honorees have included Marie-Claire Alain (New York City), Charles Callahan Louis), David Craighead (Philadelphia), Gerre and Judith Hancock (New York City), Joyce Jones (Fort Worth), Marilyn Keiser (New York City), Marilyn Mason (Ann Arbor), Thomas Murray (New Haven), John Obetz (Kansas City), Frederick Swann (Los Angeles), and John and Marianne Weaver (Philadelphia).

Those unable to attend the 2015 AGO Gala will receive a copy of the

commemorative program book with their contribution of \$50 or more to the AGO Endowment Fund. ## INVITATION to the European Chapter AGO Fall Meeting 2015

Dear fellow-members and friends of the European Chapter of the American Guild of Organists,

It is with great pleasure that we can now officially invite all of you to join us at the **Fall Meeting 2015** in Ingelheim am Rhein, Germany! Ingelheim is not only a charming wine town on the banks of the Rhine River, it is also the new home of an authentic American Skinner Organ, the largest Skinner organ in Europe and the only one here in a church, which is the target of our excursion.

Some of you may have already heard about the big project that our member **Carsten Lenz** initiated several years ago in Ingelheim. In 2008 the Saalkirche there purchased the organ from the First Presbyterian Church in Passaic, New Jersey, but without the case and façade pipes. This instrument was built in 1930 by E. M. Skinner. An Antiphonal-Division was added in 1952. It thus has 5 divisions and the stops of the Choir, Swell and Solo divisions have a range of C-c<sup>5</sup> to enable the octave couplers to go all the way up! The virtually unchanged instrument was restored and installed in the Saalkirche in Ingelheim with a new case and console by the Johannes Klais Company (Bonn) in 2013. It was enlarged with a Pedal division in the original style and partly with original pipework from other Skinner organs. The Disposition can be found on the Klais Web Site

The Fall Meeting will start on Friday, September 25<sup>th</sup>, (arrival, dinner, and opening concert) and will finish Sunday forenoon, Sept. 27<sup>th</sup>, with a service in the Saalkirche. Four of our members will perform the evening concert, others will play for a less formal afternoon event on Saturday, and still others can contribute musically to the worship service on Sunday morning. **Not all of these slots are filled! Bring your music and we'll see where you all will fit in!** All participants will be able to take part in a project choir which will rehearse on Saturday and also sing in the service. If the Skinner Organ alone isn't enough to attract your attention, there is also the opportunity on Saturday afternoon to visit a nearby historic organ. Please read the attached itinerary for more details.
