Spring Meeting 2016 in Scotland Mon., March 28th – Fri., April 1st

Registration deadline: Sunday Jan. 31st We are looking forward very much to meeting in Scotland during Easter week! Scotland is home to a collection of late 19th and early 20th century organs which illustrate the distinctive artistic paths taken by the UK's leading builders of the time. The instruments to be visited in Dundee, Glasgow and Edinburgh include unaltered examples of the work of 'Father' Henry Willis, William Hill, his son Thomas Hill, the Yorkshire Schulze-disciples Forster and Andrews, their strikingly original Yorkshire neighbors Wordsworth and Maskell and, as if that wasn't enough, two of the UK's most outstanding early 20th century 'town hall' organs by Arthur Harrison and Norman & Beard respectively. The group will be guided by organist and writer Chris Bragg, organ historian and consultant Matthew Hynes and Edinburgh City Organist, Dr John Kitchen.

Participants will also enjoy a day in historic St. Andrews with free time to explore this ancient town, the 'home of golf', with its ruined Medieval Cathedral and Castle. In St. Andrews, participants will also attend an organ recital by Canadian pedagogue John legendary Grew, a piano recital by Dutch pianist Ronald Brautigam (renowned as one of the world's leading Beethoven interpreters) and an option lunchtime harpsichord recital featuring the second part of Bach's Clavierübung performed by outstanding University organ scholar, Sean Heath.

As usual, our Spring Meeting will begin with the Opening Dinner on Easter Monday and will end with the Closing Banquet on Friday evening. Bed and Breakfast Accommodation in the hotel (Premier Inn, Dundee East) has been reserved for five nights (arriving 28 March, departing 2 April) but must be paid for when you register. Organ/Clavichord Meeting in Saint-Avold, France [workshop & concerts]

Together with the dean of the Saint-Avold conservatoire and the professional help of Alissa Duryee and Vincent Bernhardt professor (organ the Metz at conservatoire), Muller Fabrice is and organizing a clavichord organ intensive in Saint-Avold, May 19 through 22. This encounter will be open to both organists (beginners through advanced) who wish to perfect their art, and to nonorganists who wish to discover both the organ and the clavichord. Three concerts will be presented during the course of the weekend. Katelyn Emerson and Katie Minion who are currently studying in Toulouse on Fulbright scholarships will be special guests. Public subsidies pending, the price of tuition will be quite modest (in the neighborhood of 15 euros). Please consider attending and tell your students! The only requests to participants are as follows:

2. Bring at least one short piece of music you have well-prepared [do not hesitate to be in contact for recommendations regarding repertoire]



Steve Gentile played a concert in memory of Massimo Nosetti. on October 25th, 2015, at the Catholic Church of St. Helena in Minneapolis. It was also in celebration of the 25th anniversary of additions to the Wicks organ which were installed while Steve was organist there. The program included works by D. Buxtehude, J. S. Bach, C. Franck, N. Boulanger, R. Jones, E. Pasini, M. Nosetti's "Variations on a Japanese Folk Tune" (1995) and Rondo-Scherzo (1989) (dedicated to Steve Gentile), the U.S. premier of the Trio: "Mit Ernst, o Menschenkinder" (2014) by Andrew Tessman (b. 1988) and also the U.S. premier of Nosetti's last composition "Preludio su 'Universi qui te exspectant" (Gradual for Advent I - Let none who hope in you, Lord, be put to shame. O Lord, make me know your ways. Teach me your paths.) from Oct. 12, 2013.

Steve studied at the Oberlin Conservatory of Music, the University of Minnesota, and at Northwestern He also studied at the University. International Academy in Haarlem and in Paris with Michel Pinte. Having served as Director of Music/Organist at the Church of St. Helena in Minneapolis for 28 years, he returned there as the Assistant Organist after a hiatus of five years. He taught for 34 years at the MacPhail Center for the Arts (formerly a part of the University of Minnesota) and continues to teach private organ students, substitute and concertize.

His repertoire extends from the old masters to the great romantics and he greatly enjoys performing contemporary pieces composed by his friends. He has performed in France (including St. Clotilde, Paris), Spain, Italy, Hong Kong and throughout the United States. In 2015 he performed music by Massimo Nosetti at the Spring Meeting of the European Chapter in Italy. The widow of the composer was present for the event.

Gentile has been a member of the Executive Board and a long-time member of the Education Committee of the Twin Cities Chapter of the American Guild of Organists; he has served as Sub-dean, Program Chair and Dean and is presently on the Pipedreams Scholarship Committee. He is well-known as a clinician, recitalist, and adjudicator. He has also composed religious music, mostly settings of Psalms.

Bernard Sanders' composition "Venite Adoremus: A Christmas Fantasy" has been accepted for publication bv Concordia Publishing House. The Fantasy consists of Chorale Preludes on the Hymn-Tunes "Gelobet Seist Du", "Greensleeves", Mysterium", and "Divinum "Ouem Pastores" preceded by and connected to each other with material from "Adeste Fidelis" and a concluding Toccata upon that Hymn-Tune. Each of the Chorale settings can also be played separately. It is scheduled for release in May.

For the AGO National Convention 2016 the Houston Chapter held a composition contest for Chorale Preludes on Hymn-Tunes written after 1960. Nineteen entries were chosen to be published along with commissioned several works in а "Bayoubüchlein" which will be distributed at the Convention in June. Composers were invited to send in up to three works. All three entries by Bernard Sanders were chosen for inclusion. These being "Tree of Life" (by Bruce Becker), "Lord of Life" (by Kevin J. Hildebrandt), and "Stay With Us" (by Walter Pelz).

Member **Michael König** shares his story about concertizing in Africa:

Being just a free-lance organist, Rodgers has sent me to Kenya in June to find out about possibilities for organ education (they believe organ sales will only happen if there are organists who can play).

While in Nairobi the contacts to people in charge of Catholic Church music on a national level were established, and I was told about their choir festival in late October. Having recognized this to be a major event for showcasing an organ, Rodgers agreed to send an instrument there and sponsored me to play it.

As the weeks went by, information about the Pope's visit started to appear, and again Rodgers offered to sponsor the organ and the organist. Finally, I heard about the National Catholic Eucharistic Congress to be held in Subukia in early October, with some 20,000 people expected to come. To have a dress rehearsal for November in terms of logistics and cooperation with the Catholic Church in Kenya, this event was also outfitted with a Rodgers organ, and again yours truly was the organist.

Many people here have already told me that these events have significantly changed the way Kenyan church musicians think about the organ. So I can only be thankful to Rodgers for having sent me there with all the freedom to do whatever helps to promote the beauty of the organ and organ music.

Introducing Our Members

Organist, improviser, pedagogue, composer and blogger **Dr. Vidas Pinkevičius** is the creator of "Secrets of Organ Playing" - a blog with tips and

training for organists and a weekly podcast which features in-depth conversations with experts from the organ world who share their insights. He is an active promoter of organ improvisation and the art of the organ and popularizes this instrument through lectures, seminars, demonstrations recitals. Currently he is and the president and co-founder of the National Association of Organists (NAO) and teaches at the National M.K.Čiurlionis School of Arts. He is also the organist of Vilnius University and heads the university organ studio "Unda Maris". Further, he initiated the NAO educational project "the Organ for the Future of Lithuania" with the goal of introducing the pipe organ to a general audience in various parts of Lithuania, especially to children.

One of his specialties is storytelling through organ improvisation based on biblical and liturgical themes, literary works, poetry, visual art, fairy tales, legends and myths of various nations of the world. In 2015 he improvised musical stories based on "the Legend About the Founding of Vilnius", "the Little Mermaid", "Egle, Queen of Grass-Snakes", "From "Jurate and Kastytis", and Harmony: Improvisations for Saint Cecilia Day". He has appeared in international organ festivals throughout Europe and the USA.

AGO Pipe Organ Encounters provide youth and adults with opportunities for intensive study of the King of Instruments

Nine Summer Programs for Teenagers and Adults Will Be Supported with Generous Funding from the Associated Pipe Organ Builders of America, the American Institute of Organbuilders, and the Jordan Organ Endowment

New York City. The AGO is proud to PIPE announce seven ORGAN ENCOUNTERS (POEs) for students aged 13-18, one POE (Advanced) for students entering grades 9-12; and one POE+ for adults in 2016. POE for ages 13–18

POE+ for adults

The PIPE ORGAN ENCOUNTER (POE) is an introduction to the pipe organ through instruction in organ playing, repertoire, history, design, and construction. These regional summer music institutes for teenage students provide private and group instruction in service playing and solo repertoire, opportunities to learn about the musical heritage of various religious denominations, and a chance for young musicians to meet others with similar interests. Piano or organ proficiency ranging from intermediate to advanced is required. Scholarship assistance is available.

The POE (Advanced) provides intermediate to advanced classes in areas such as organ literature, history, pipe organ construction and design, music theory, improvisation, conducting, and service playing for students who have achieved a high level of success in organ study. Scholarship assistance is available.

The POE+ is a summer program filled with practical information and instruction for adult keyboard musicians interested in improving their service-playing skills. Participants will be introduced to basic organ skills through private instruction and classes. The weeklong experience will lead to greater confidence and competence at the organ.

Generous funding from the Associated Pipe Organ Builders of America (APOBA), the American Institute of Organbuilders (AIO), and the Jordan Organ Endowment will support the summer programs from coast to coast. "The AGO and APOBA have enjoyed a mutually beneficial relationship since 1975," declared AGO Executive Director James Thomashower. "Likewise, the AIO has been active in supporting the Guild's educational programs, beginning with their partnership in Pulling Out All the Stops, a video produced jointly by the AGO, AIO, APOBA, the Organ Historical Society, and the American Theater Organ Society in 1996. Collectively, APOBA and the AIO have contributed more than a half million dollars in support of the AGO's educational programs during our long association. In addition, we are delighted to have received a ten-year commitment of the Jordan Organ support from Endowment at Columbus State University for our POE program. For all this committed generosity in supporting the Guild's mission-to enrich lives through organ and choral music—we are deeply grateful."

POE site locations are selected by the AGO Committee on the New Organist and approved by the AGO National Council after application by AGO host chapters. Applications are available from AGO National Headquarters. The application deadline is April 15.
