AGO Pipe Organ Encounters Provide Youth and Adults with Opportunities for Intensive Study of the King of Instruments

New York City. The AGO is proud to announce 5 Pipe Organ Encounters (POEs) for students aged 13–18, and one POE+ for adults in 2018. Complete contact information for each weeklong Pipe Organ Encounter can be found in The American Organist Magazine and online at

POE+ (for adults)

June 17–22 Rockford, Ill.

The Pipe Organ Encounter (POE) is an introduction to the pipe organ through instruction in organ playing, repertoire, history, design, and construction. These regional summer music camps for teenage students provide private and group instruction in service playing and solo repertoire, opportunities to learn about the musical heritage of various religious denominations, and a chance for young musicians to meet others with similar interests. Piano or organ proficiency ranging from intermediate to advanced is required. Scholarship assistance is available.

The POE+ is a summer program filled with practical information and instruction for adult keyboard musicians interested in improving their service-playing skills. Participants will be introduced to basic organ skills through private instruction and classes. The weeklong experience will lead to

greater confidence and competence at the organ.

Generous funding from the Associated Pipe Organ **Builders** of America (APOBA), the American Institute of Organbuilders (AIO), the Jordan Organ Endowment, and the National Endowment for the Arts will support these summer educational programs from coast to coast. "The AGO and APOBA have enjoyed a mutually beneficial relationship since 1975," declared AGO Executive Director James Thomashower. "Likewise, the AIO has been active in supporting the Guild's educational programs, beginning with their partnership in Pulling Out All the Stops, a video produced jointly in 1996 by the AGO, AIO, APOBA, the Organ Historical Society, and the American Theater Organ Society and aired on PBS. In addition, we are delighted to have received support from the Jordan Organ Endowment at Columbus State University for our POE program, as well as a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts supporting our educational activities this year."

In addition to the POE and POE+ programs, but not offered in 2018, is a POE (Advanced) that provides intermediate to advanced classes in areas such as organ literature, history, pipe organ construction and design, music theory, improvisation, conducting, and service playing for students who have achieved a high level of success in organ study. Also, there is a POE (Technical) designed for students who are interested in learning the art and craft of organ building. The event is hosted in the workshop of an organ builder working in cooperation with a local AGO chapter.

POE site locations are selected by the AGO Committee on Pipe Organ Encounters and approved by the AGO National Council. Applications for 2019 are available from AGO National Headquarters and online at www.agohq.org

Obituary

Yuko Hayashi Nov. 2, 1929- Jan. 7, 2018

Yuko Hayashi, international concert artist and professor of organ at New England Conservatory, Boston, died of natural causes on January 7, 2018 under hospice care at The Residence at Salem Woods, Salem NH. She was 88.

Yuko Hayashi was born in Hiratsuka, Japan on November 2, 1929. For more than 40 years she was professor of organ at the New England Conservatory and department chair for 30 years. As a performer, she concertized extensively on three continents – Asia, North America, and Europe, giving recitals and masterclasses in Japan, South Korea, the United States of America, Holland, Germany, Belgium, Austria, Switzerland, Denmark, Italy,

Spain, and Portugal. She was the recipient of the coveted *Arion Award* from the Cambridge Society for Early Music as an "outstanding performer and master teacher of the historical organ". She was also awarded the *Distinguished Alumni Award* from the New England Conservatory.

Ms. Hayashi graduated with a degree in organ performance from Tokyo University of the Arts in 1948 and for five years was organist for the symphony orchestra of NHK, the Japanese national broadcasting company. She came to the United States in 1953 on scholarship, sponsored by PEO (Philanthropic Educational Organization) and studied for one year at Cottey College in Nevada, Missouri. She then transferred to the New England Conservatory in Boston where she was awarded three degrees in organ performance: Bachelor of Music, Master of Music, and Artist Diploma. In 1960 she began teaching at the conservatory, and was appointed chair of the department in 1969 by then president Gunther Schuller. Her primary teachers were George Faxon, Donald Willing, Anton Heiller, and Gustav Leonhardt (harpsichord). Her frequent travels to Europe began in 1966 when she went to the Haarlem Organ Academy in Holland and began lifelong associations with Anton Heiller, Luigi Tagliavini, and Marie-Claire Alain. In 1971, she studied with Michel Chapuis in France, and was introduced to many historic organs in North Germany and Holland by Harald Vogel and Klaas Bolt. This was the beginning of many exchanges of concerts and masterclasses across the Atlantic Ocean between Boston and Europe. It was during this time that Ms. Hayashi became organist of Old West Church in Boston, performing on a new mechanical action organ built by Charles B. Fisk. She served as organist there for nearly 40 years and was the founder and executive director of the Old West Organ Society until her retirement in 2010. Concert artists who collaborated in teaching with Ms. Hayashi in Boston included Guy Bovet, Jean Boyer, Umberto Pineschi, Joan Lippincott, Roberta Gary, Karel Paukert, Bill Porter, Mireille Lagacé, Frank Taylor, Robert Schunemann, Donald Teeters, Peter Sykes, Christa Rackich, James David Christie, Michael Radulescu, Peter Planyavsky, and Jon Gillock.

European News

Organ Construction and Organ Music Become Intangible Cultural Heritage

December, 2017. At its meeting in Jeju, South Korea, UNESCO approved the request of the Federal Republic of Germany to include "organ building and organ music" in the list of intangible cultural heritage of humanity. In addition to the tradition and innovation of the German organ culture, the broad variety and the numerous activities of the organ community convinced the internal and external reviewers to recommend making the entry. As author of the proposition paper on behalf of the Association of German Organ Consultants (VOD) Prof. Dr. Michael G. Kaufmann thanked all those who have supported him directly or indirectly.

Introducing Our Members

Margreeth Chr. [Margaretha Christina] de Jong (*1961) graduated from Rotterdam Conservatory in 1986 with Diplomas in Church Music, Organ Music Pedagogy, and Organ Solo Performance with a score of 10 - the highest possible mark in the Netherlands. In view of this exceptional achievement, the Dutch Ministry of Welfare, Health, and Cultural Affairs awarded her a grant for further special study abroad three times. This allowed her to work with Guy Bovet in Switzerland, and with Jean Langlais and Marie-Louise Langlais at the famous Schola Cantorum in Paris. There she gained the Prix de Virtuosité in 1988, again with the highest distinction. That same year, she won first prizes at international organ competitions in Paris and Haarlem (César Franck Competition).

In 1994, she was decorated with a silver medal by the Société Académique "Arts -Sciences - Lettres" in Paris in recognition of her contributions to French organ culture. She was awarded a Knighthood in the Order of Orange-Nassau by Queen Beatrix of the Netherlands in 2012. When the Council of Mayor and Aldermen (the executive board of the municipality) of Middelburg appointed her city organist in 2014, an old tradition of the capital of Zeeland was reinstalled after two centuries. At the same time Margreeth Chr. de Jong became Middelburg's first female organist in this venerable tradition; moreover, she is also expected to be active as a composer in this capacity.

Next to being city organist, Margreeth Chr. de Jong is university organist, music director of the Nieuwe Kerk, and organist of the Église Wallone, Middelburg. She has given numerous solo recitals in Western Europe and been featured in major concert series. She has also made many radio, television and CD recordings. Since 2005, she has taught as professor of organ and theory at the University College Roosevelt, the International Honors College of Utrecht University in Middelburg. Moreover, she is very active as a composer. Her work includes compositions for organ, choir, soprano and organ, violin and organ, cello and organ, and string orchestra.

Her compositions are performed all over the world and the majority has been published in Europe and in the USA.

Margreeth is married with the well-known musicologist Albert Clement. They have 3 children, aged 21, 19 and 18.


