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# The Dean's Corner

Dear European Chapter Members,

Despite the times we live in, I wish you all the best for the New Year 2021 !

Maybe many of you had hoped that this spring would gradually evolve towards 'normal'. Fortunately, the end of the corona measures is gradually approaching, but at the same time it is becoming clear that we are not at that point yet. Fortunately, the first vaccines have arrived sooner than expected, but the logistical implications of their use are what they are.

The past few months certainly have been politically tense for some of our members, and I'm sure the rest has been following from afar.

We hope all the more for a better 2021 ! Just before the sun rises, it can be very dark. But we will get through this, in the end it will all turn out fine.

Many of you will be eager to know what the next Spring Meeting will look like. Initially we had hoped that somehow we would be able to continue where we had stopped last time, that it would just look like a year's break and then move on. As awareness grew that the pandemic would last longer than initially thought, we thought of a shorter version of the Spring Meeting, with fewer participants but still with a few people together.

Now, by the beginning of the New Year, we are convinced that by April we will still be bound by many travel restrictions (quarantine obligations on arrival or return, limited air traffic, maximum one passenger from outside the family in the car etc.). Furthermore, at that time the restaurants may still be closed or may have just reopened and may only let a few people in at a time. And maybe very few people will still be allowed to be in the same room at the same time.

In short, for all these reasons, we are considering a digital alternative to our Spring Meeting in which online contacts and contributions receive attention.

I am very curious about the way you have experienced the past year, and about the solutions you had to come up with. For example, how did you deal with the suddenly available time?

How did you maintain contact with friends / family ? For example, I drive to my mother's to make video calls with my kids so she can see her grandchildren.

And how do you solve the problems with church services and playing concerts? Almost every day I play a church service with video stream / regional TV. On weekdays it's a short church service, on the weekends a longer one. We try to solve the 'grayness' by programming as beautiful music as possible. Because of the often changing corona-measures those plans often have to be adjusted (no choir, no trumpets or oboe, string quartet instead; then again limitation in the number of people that may be present, so string quartet reduced to string duo, eventually reduced to one cellist). People then see you perform a few things online or on TV, but don't realize that you first prepared / negotiated / organized four other plans that also took a lot of time.

Do you also have to deal with choir rehearsals, and how to keep the members together?

In the music school, I experience the management's concern to keep as many students as possible on board. One of the subjects I teach is Ensemble Playing. As pupils haven't been allowed yet to play piano 4-hand, I had to deploy DJ-skills with the missing part on computer. But first getting all those parts into the computer...

The most important question that worries me, of course, is: what are you doing to maintain the organ culture in these times?

As you read, there are plenty of things to talk about. We hope to be able to offer you a podium to be able to exchange these fascinating experiences soon.

#### The Organ: Instrument of the Year 2021

The German Music Council (der Deutsche Musikrat) has named the organ "Instrument of the Year 2021". (See the 2020 October issue). To increase awareness the Roman Catholic Diocese of Rottenburg-Stuttgart, Germany, has declared a

#### Diocesan Organ Day May 8<sup>th</sup>/9<sup>th</sup> 2021

and is sponsoring workshops in order to prepare for this event. Topics include: what kind of events can one hold, how to present your organ, how to demonstrate an instrument (methods and literature), how to encourage participation, and handling public relations (press coverage). The Workshops take place in March and April.

By the way: In addition, the "Day of the Organ", which takes place every year, will take place on **September 12<sup>th</sup>**, **2021**.
