After searching the internet, with the aid of Google (Dresden hotels), I have found the Ibis Hotel Dresden (there are three in this large hotel complex: Ibis Dresden Koenigstein, Bastei and Lilienstein) at www.Expedia.com (or Expedia.nl Expedia.de) to be THE choice for our group considering both reasonable price and location. AGO AWARDED \$15,000 GRANT BY THE NATIONAL ENDOWMENT FOR THE ARTS

NEA Funding Will Support New Music Commissions and Premier Performances at the AGO National Convention in Washington, D.C., July 4–8, 2010

New York City — The AGO has been awarded an Access to Artistic Excellence grant by the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) to support the commissioning and premier performances of new music at the biennial AGO National Convention in Washington, D.C., July 4–8, 2010. The \$15,000 grant carries a mandate that it be matched dollar for dollar from other funding sources. The 2009–2010 funding cycle will mark the fourth and fifth consecutive years the AGO has received funding through the NEA's Access to Artistic Excellence grant program.

For its 50th biennial national convention in Washington, D.C., the AGO has commissioned new compositions from: Mary Beth Bennett, Rihards Dubra, David Hurd, Rachel Laurin, Shirley Murray, Leo

Nestor, Bruce Neswick, Dorothy Papadakos, Craig Phillips, and Gwyneth Walker. Premier performances of the commissioned works will be given by world-class soloists, ensembles, and conductors dedicated to artistic excellence.

The new music commissions include works for: organ solo; organ and orchestral instruments; organ and jazz ensemble; organ and chorus; two organs and chorus; organ, brass, and chorus; and a hymn. In addition to being present for the premieres of their new works, the composers will be presented in a Composers' Forum workshop at the convention.

"Since its founding in 1896, the AGO has commissioned more new works for organ chorus than any other single organization in the world," declared AGO President Eileen Guenther. "The AGO also provides outstanding performances of these new works. It is an honor for us to be recognized by the NEA, and we are highly grateful for the grants that will enable this tradition to continue when we meet for our 2010 AGO National Convention in the Nation's Capital. The recognition by the NEA reaffirms the importance of new music commissions to increase organ and choral repertoire available to future generations, and to increase the American public's knowledge of and appreciation for contemporary classical music. The AGO is especially interested in supporting new music for the concert stage, as there are increasing numbers of American concert halls being constructed or renewed that contain new or rebuilt organs."

The Arts Endowment will distribute \$23,215,500 in this first round of fiscal year 2009 funding to support 1,051 projects, continuing its legacy of bringing arts of the highest quality to communities nationwide. Endowment The distribute \$20,325,500 to not-for-profit national, regional, state, and organizations across the country through Access to Artistic Excellence grants. Through this category, the NEA will fund 886 projects out of 1,394 eligible applications.

"I am delighted to announce the NEA's first round of grants for fiscal year 2009," stated NEA Chairman Dana Gioia. "We often hear from our grantees that the NEA's grant support has a catalytic effect, helping the organization to garner exponentially additional funding for its project. These grants are an investment in our nation's culture, and I am proud to say that the return on that investment benefits Americans from coast to coast."

Restricted Access to Online Job Postings Begins December 15, 2008

New York City — The AGO is pleased to

announce an exclusive benefit of AGO membership. Effective Monday, December 15, 2008, job listings posted online at www.agohq.org will only be accessible by AGO voting members. Individuals wishing to view these pages must first validate their membership using their last name and AGO membership number, found on the mailing label of The American Organist Magazine. This policy decision, to deny the general public access to the job postings, was approved unanimously by the AGO National Council at its meeting in October 2008.

"Membership has its privileges," remarked Executive Director AGO James Thomashower. "By limiting access to our online job postings, we are increasing the value of membership to our voting members by providing priority access to job information not available to others. Employers can rest assured knowing that their job postings are being seen by the members of the world's largest organization devoted to the organ and choral music. These individuals have pledged to abide by the AGO Code of Professional Ethics and Code of Standards."

AGO membership is open to all and includes working professionals—organists, choral conductors, teachers, organbuilders, technicians, and suppliers to the field — as well as students, clergy, amateur musicians. and dedicated supporters. Individuals can join the AGO through local chapters or as a member without chapter affiliation. To join a local chapter, individuals can identify the chapter nearest them using the zip code search from the AGO home page. Membership numbers will be provided to those who join a local chapter once the chapter's dues report is received at AGO National Headquarters.
