# Members' News

Our member **Rhonda Edgington** and her husband Mark are proud parents of a baby girl born on Tuesday at 3:35 in the afternoon in Bremen, Germany. Esther Amelia weighed 7.1 pounds and was 20.9 inches long. Mom and daughter are healthy and doing well, and Dad and big brother Isaac are proud and excited. Congratulations to the whole family!

Commissioned works by **Bernard Sanders** were premiered in the US and in Germany. A 3 movement piece for Flute and Organ entitled "... from the Realms of Glory" was commissioned by Dr. Sharon L. Hettinger in memory of her mother. Dr. Hettinger is Director of Music and Organist at St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in Kansas City, Missouri. She and the Haitian flautist Guy Montes performed the work there on November 1<sup>st</sup>, 2009. Concordia Publishing House has already accepted it as well as "4 Chorale Preludes on Hymns of Trust" for publication.

Sanders' setting of Psalm 117 for 5 part mixed choir, 2 Trumpets, 2 Organ, Trombones, Tympani, and Carillon was premiered at St. Martin's Church in Wangen in Allgäu, Germany, on Oct. 30<sup>th</sup>, 2009. The singers of the Diocesan Choir Project Week performed it under the direction of Marianne Aicher. This work was commissioned in 2007 by the Carillon virtuoso Boudewijn Zwart and Stichting Apeldoornse beiaard in the Apeldoorn, Netherlands. Lacking a Carillon at the location, a transcription of the bell part for vibraphone was substituted.

More of Sanders' compositions were broadcast on the nationally syndicated radio program PIPE DREAMS. Their program Nr. 0948 entitled "Advent **Expressions**" included his "Festive Prelude on the 8<sup>th</sup> Mode" as well as the "Triptych on Veni Emanuel" as performed by Julian Bewig on the Fischer & Krämer organ at St. Mary's Church in Emsdetten, Germany (as recorded on the CD "Berceuse", Classicophon CL-2009-010). Tune in to PIPE DREAMS and listen to the program!

Heather Hernandez has been the Director of Parish Music at Lutheran Church of the Master in Phoenix for five and a half years now. She is also on the staff of the Phoenix Girls Chorus which will be on tour in 2010 to Oregon for the Pacific International Children's Choir Festival and to Hawaii for the Pacific Rim Children's Chorus Festival. Heather will play an organ recital at the University of Nevada Las Vegas on April 16, 2010 as part of the Southern Nevada AGO concert series. She is still the secretary and awards chair for the Sigma Alpha Iota Phoenix Alumnae chapter and became director of the Doctoral Grant program at the national level this fall.

A native of France, Fabrice Roland Muller earned a Master of Music degree in Organ Performance and Literature at the Eastman School of Music, University of Rochester in 2008. He also was awarded two graduate diplomas at the Nancy Conservatoire: a première médaille in Musicianship and a Concert Diploma in Organ. He has earned médailles d'or in organ, Renaissance organ, harpsichord performance, and the first prize in Baroque chamber music performance at the Nancy and Metz Conservatories. At the Université de Nancy 2, he obtained an undergraduate degree in Musicology. In 2005, he was a recipient of a Lurcy scholarship, allotted each year to six French citizens for study in the United States. In 1996, he won First Prize at the supérieur level at the Concours International d'Orgue de Lorraine, at which Marie-Claire Alain chaired the board of examiners.

Muller has attended various schools, summer programs, and master classes, notably at Eastman, the conservatories of Luxembourg, Metz. Nancy, and Strasbourg, and the Académie de l'Orgue de St-Dié-des-Vosges. His diverse primary performance teachers have been Jonathan Biggers, Anne-Catherine Bucher, Hans Davidsson, Jean-Philippe Fetzer, Francis Jean-Jacques Kasel, Francois Jacob. Norbert Pétry, and Ménissier. Todd Wilson. Other teachers include Marie-Claire Alain, Jean Boyer, François Espinasse, Bernard and Mireille Lagacé, Jean-Pierre Leguay, and Michael Radulescu. Muller has experience with keyboard instruments from many different places and eras: from the 1537 Jean de Trèves Organ in the Metz Cathedral to the 1927 E.M. Skinner Organ at St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Rochester, NY; from the Italian harpsichord to the English virginal; and from the pedal clavichord to the pedal piano.

Muller is passionate about both the beauty of sound and the learning process. He has performed in France, Germany, Luxembourg, and the U.S., and on France Musique. Upon his return to France in 2008, he played Poulenc's Concerto at Saint Louis des Invalides Church in Paris for the 60<sup>th.</sup> anniversary of the Franco-American Commission for Educational Exchange (Fulbright). From 1993 to 2003, he was organist at the Evangelical Lutheran Church of the Cross in Strasbourg. Muller enjoys teaching organ and harpsichord and has taught students in the U.S. and France. Currently, he serves as professor and chair of the Musicianship Department at the Arras Conservatoire in northern France. In addition, he is pursuing Confessional independent studies in Lutheran Theology, which provide further insights into Bach's music.

Every performer has a link to their venue and every venue has a link to all its performers—a seamless and logical connection from one Web page to another.

Under the **<u>REGISTRATION</u>** menu, you can register for the convention and the Marriott convention hotel. When you register for the convention, use the links (as mentioned above) to make your choices.

#### Anthony Baglivi Retires as Editor of The American Organist Magazine

**New York City**. The AGO, the largest organization in the world dedicated to organ and choral music, honors Anthony Baglivi upon his retirement after more than three decades of service as editor and advertising manager of The American Organist Magazine. The publication is the official journal of the American Guild of Organists and the Associated Pipe Organ Builders of America and has a monthly circulation of 24,000.

Mr. Baglivi joined the AGO National Headquarters staff in 1973 as editorial assistant. He assumed responsibilities for advertising and production of the magazine in February 1974, as managing editor in May 1980, and as editor in August 1982. Earlier this year, Mr. Baglivi announced his intention to retire from the AGO effective December 31, 2009. The AGO National Council has awarded him the title of editor emeritus, which he will assume on January 1, 2010. Todd R. Sisley has appointed been acting editor and advertising manager.

"In his 36-year AGO career, Tony has been personally responsible for selecting thousands of letters and articles for publication, laying out more than 25,000 pages of editorial and advertising copy, and generating millions of dollars in advertising income," declared AGO Executive Director James Thomashower. "Under his leadership, The American Organist Magazine became the world's leading journal in the organ and choral field, with more readers, more advertisers, and more editorial content than any other periodical serving this market."

"The American Guild of Organists and the entire organ profession have benefitted from Anthony Baglivi's loving attention to every detail, his vision of what needs to be shared, and the best way to communicate it," added AGO President Eileen Guenther. Thomashower continues: "Tony is much more than the editor of a magazine; he is a true leader of the profession. I join my staff co-workers in praising him for his unstinting commitment to excellence in every aspect of the magazine's production, and his uncanny gift for balancing the rigorous and often conflicting demands of his position."

In honor of the many years of distinguished service Anthony Baglivi has given to the Guild, the AGO National Council, cooperation with in the Associated Pipe Organ Builders of America, has created a permanently endowed scholarship in his name. Annual earnings from the scholarship fund will support an award to be given to a student attending an AGO Pipe Organ Encounter (Technical). AGO President Eileen Guenther announced the appointment of Todd Sisley as acting editor and advertising manager of American Organist Magazine, The effective January 1, 2010. Sisley began work at AGO National Headquarters in 1993 as an assistant in the membership department. He gradually assumed other duties over the next four years eventually becoming more involved with The American Organist Magazine and working as assistant to Daniel Colburn, AGO Executive Director 1980–1995. "With changes to the staff in January of 1998, Robert Price and I asked Todd to work exclusively for the magazine," stated Anthony Baglivi. "Todd is a first-class, professional musician and an extremely talented editor. He has worked closely with the magazine's senior staff for over ten years and is ideally suited to take over the duties of editor."
