Membership Report + "grow the guild"

Membership in the European Chapter is at an all-time high. As of October 2011, we have a total of 96 members. This total includes all categories of membership: Regular, Special, Student, Partner, Dual, Chapter Friends and Honorary members who live in Germany, France, Spain, Italy, City State, Belgium, Vatican the Netherlands, Denmark, Lichtenstein, the Republic of Moldova, Switzerland, Norway, Scotland, England, Australia, Canada and USA the (Connecticut, Massachusetts, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Virginia, Oklahoma, Arizona, Colorado, Montana, Washington and Oregon). The steady growth of the European Chapter can be seen in the membership figures:

In order to continue this growth, I invite all of our members to be aware of the National AGO sponsored contest "grow the guild," which began on June 1st, 2011, and will run through May 31st, 2012. European Chapter Spring Meeting 2012 in York, GB

If you're interested in combining a stay in one of England's prime tourist destinations with a chance to sample an eclectic mix of English organs, then the Spring Meeting 2012 is for you!

Plans are now well advanced for a rich and varied week based in the medieval walled city of York, in the north of England. We'll be staying in the heart of the city, within easy walking distance of the train station, which is directly linked to the major international airports of London and Manchester.

We plan to hear and play a wide range of instruments in terms of size and design, located in cathedrals, tonal churches, chapels, concert halls and private homes of modest to stately proportions. Members will gain an exciting and varied taste of the English organ scene past and present, whilst also sampling historic cities, countryside locations and even a the visit to coast! This will be

a real week of contrasts, including familiar and innovatory events - not to be missed!

Spring Meeting 2012 will convene on Monday April 9th for an evening dinner at our hotel, The Queen's Hotel, York, which overlooks the River Ouse right in the centre of the city.

On Tuesday April 10th our focus will be entirely on organs within the city centre. From the many fascinating instruments on offer we have selected the following:

Central Methodist Church

IIIP 43 Wood Wordsworth 1967 St Olave's

IIIP 43 Principal Pipe Organs 1986 All Saints Pavement

IIIP 54 Wood Wordsworth 1964 All Saints North Street

IIP 15 Forster & Andrews 1867 with a grand finale for the day planned at the largest gothic cathedral in Northern Europe, York Minster, with its IVP 84 Hill/Harrison & Harrison/Walker/PPO organ dating originally from the nineteenth century. Here members will have a favoured opportunity to play a particularly fine example of an English cathedral organ whilst viewing one of the top tourist attractions in our country.

The following day, Wednesday, April 11th, we'll be using coach travel to explore a range of mainly larger instruments located to the east of York. Beginning with the landmark neo-baroque 1969 Grant, Degens & Bradbeer IIIP 31 in the concert hall of York University, we will then travel to the historic market town of Beverley. Here we plan to visit Beverley Minster, a cathedral in all but name, with its impressive IVP 73 instrument begun by Snetzler in 1769, with later rebuilds and additions which have preserved his original pipework. After lunch we shall have a brief visit to hear the IVP 73 Forster & Andrews organ in St Mary's Church before taking our coach to the City of Hull.

Here we hope to introduce you to one of the most renowned concert hall organs in England. First built by Forster & Andrews in 1911 the City Hall organ has 141 stops disposed across four manuals and pedals. Apart from all the predictable tonal colours, which are in abundance, here you will have the chance to try out a remarkable range of orchestral and percussion effects which caused great controversy at the time of its design.

On leaving the City Hall, we then have the option of visiting the IVP 104 Forster & Andrews instrument in Holy Trinity Church, which we may visit before driving to the home of Mr. & Mrs. Paul Derrett for a buffet meal and chance to play their five manual house organ. (No, that is not a misprint!)

On Thursday April 11th we'll be travelling to the west of York to visit instruments in the cities of Leeds and Ripon. No organists' itinerary for this part of England should be without a visit to St Bartholomew's Armley with its IVP 57 instrument begun by Schulze in 1866 and worked on most recently by Harrison & Harrison in 2003. After this we shall visit Mill Hill Unitarian Chapel (IIIP 39 Norman & Beard 1910) before sampling the controversial Klais IVP 51 rebuilt in Leeds RC Cathedral in 2009. We shall end our day in style with a visit to Ripon where we will hear and play the cathedral's IVP 59 Lewis/Harrison before introducing you to a traditional Yorkshire supper of fish and chips (fries!)

The final day of our meeting takes us deep into the Yorkshire countryside to the north of York and to the coast, to visit three very special instruments. After a leisurely start, we will drive to Ampleforth Abbey to visit their IVP 104 Walker organ, built in 1961. Here the main transept organ is supplemented by an antiphonal organ at the west end of the Monk's Choir and also by a Trumpet Argentea in a recess above the High Altar. Although this might be a threat to the tranquil surroundings of the Abbey we're sure you will enjoy its rural location before travelling with us to the coastal town of Bridlington. Here, the Priory Church Anneessens has recently been rebuilt by Nicholson to provide a IVP 76 which cannot be missed.

Continuing the tradition of ending our week together in a memorable evening location, we have booked a visit with the English aristocracy! Sledmere House, between Bridlington and York, is the ancestral home of Sir Tatton & Lady Sykes as well as being home to a fine IIIP 51 Binns organ of 1928 vintage. Our visit will begin with a short demonstration of the organ, after which members will be free to play or tour the house and gardens before our buffet supper. This will be followed by musical entertainment, after which we shall bid our farewells for another year.

We hope that the above details have secured your interest in joining us in April 2012 and know you will understand that they may be subject to last minute minor changes. We have reserved an option on accommodation for approximately 40 members at The Queen's Hotel, York. The sooner you book, the more likely it is that you will be able to secure a room in this hotel with the rest of the party, so we do encourage you to make your plans without delay. Please note that we lose the option on unbooked rooms early in 2012. Booking details are as follows: Arrival 09 April 2012

On Monday, April 9th, your booking is for dinner, bed & breakfast, whilst from Tuesday 10th onwards it is for bed & breakfast only. Please provide your full contact address, contact telephone number, 16 digit credit/debit card number, expiration date and security number. Full pre payment will be taken from the card details provided approximately three working days prior to arrival with receipts issued on arrival.

Members' News

Jens Korndoerfer took second prize as well as the special prize for the best performance of Franz Liszt's "Weinen, Klagen, Sorgen, Zagen" in the final round of the Second Canadian International Organ Competition.

Concordia Publishing House commissioned Bernard Sanders to compose an organ work commemorating the 9/11 terror attacks ending in the destruction of the World Trade Center in New York. The ensuing composition is a Partita on the Hymn-Tune MENDELSSOHN. The melody is from Mendelssohn's choral setting of the text "Verleih' uns Frieden gnädiglich". The hymn text, "Grant Peace, We Pray, in Mercy, Lord", is a translation of this. The piece was premiered by Dr. Sharon L. Hettinger in St. Andrew's Episcopal Church in Kansas City, Missouri, on September 11th, 2011 – exactly 10 years after the tragedy.

Carolyn Shuster Fournier wrote an article on the recently restored Cavaillé-Coll/Mutin/Gutschenritter organ at Saint-Jean de Montmartre. It will be published in the American *Diapason*. **Giorgio Parolini** not only has a website at <u>www.giorgioparolini.com</u> he is also on Facebook.
